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THE HISTORY OF **MEMES**

Have you ever seen an internet picture with a phrase on the top and bottom? If so, you probably saw a meme. Memes are usually funny pictures or videos that are shared through popular websites on the internet. They can be shared on YouTube or by email. Have you ever wondered where these internet memes came from? Richard Dawkins coined it in his book, The Selfish Gene, in 1976.

People started sharing images through emails. They also shared through usenets and message boards. Even newsgroups were used to share. This was the start of connecting online with others. The emails and usenets went through slow, but when message boards and newsgroups were used, it allowed people to share their memes really quickly.

The memes also made people posting them curious about what people had to say. They asked for feedback and comments, or opinions. People began to start talking and having conversations through posts by commenting. They had arguments as to why a meme was better than another, as well as sending links to other memes.

This allowed for new memes to come into action. One example of this is the Hampster Dance. It took many people's comments, ideas, and suggestions and mashed them into one video.

After this, memes started to get interactive in nature. People started editing meme videos to make them seem funnier than they were at the start. A popular example of this is "Something but Stingy copyright claims everything."

You may start seeing the same meme somewhere by a new creator, without it being edited at all. This is called **plagiarism**. Plagiarism is the act of stealing someone else's work and passing it off as your own. Doing this in school or anywhere else could result in getting suspended, getting expelled, or even going to jail!

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The search engines now make it easy to find the meme you want, even with obscure information on what it is. One meme might also evolve over time as people start editing it into special versions of its original self.

When people begin to view a meme, it can go viral, meaning many people share, send, and post it for many to see. Sometimes, if it is really bad, people will call it a "dead meme". This means that a meme is really bad and people call it **cringeworthy**. Cringeworthy means that you back away in disgust at something, or shrivel up in disgust.

Memes don't even need to be from the imagination. Some memes are already existing things with captions over it or something remixed into a song. An example is "Seagulls" by Bad Lip Reading on YouTube.

Memes are one of the easiest ways to connect with others, and they even can take over games if they are able to have custom player characters, or custom items.


Using these tips should make your booktalk rock. Remember, don't give away the whole book and have fun!




